	1658				The census of Seigneurie of Beaupré indicated that on May 30, 1658, Nicolas Durand had obtained a concession located in the future parish of L'Ange-Gardien.		
	1660				Two years later, on July 11, 1660, Olivier le Tardif, magistrate and Seigneur in part of Beaupré, officially granted to Nicolas Durand this land, which he cleared and tilled in preparaton for establishing his residence there at a future date. The property measured three arpents of frontage, by one league and a half in depth, and was located between those of Jacques Goulet, and Annes Villain dit Las Mesnerye.		
1	1660	Nicolas Durand			Nicolas Durand settled on his property in L'Ange-Gardien which he had been improving since 1658, certainly looked forward to taking a wife. It is believed that the east portion of the house was built in 1660 out of wood with a stone chimney by Nicolas Durand.	1637	
	1661				On August 31, 1661, Nicolas Durand and Martin Prévost are at the dock in Québec for the arrival of the ship which carried on board Françoise Gosse.		
	1661				Two weeks later, Nicolas Durand & Françoise Gosse are married on September 12, 1661.

	1664				On October 18, 1664, in the company of some twenty of the notable citizens of the area, Robert Laberge attended the mass that M. Louis Ango des Maiserets celebrated at the home of Jean Trudelle which marked the founding of the new parish of L'Ange-Gardien. The Trudelle monument celebrating that event stands today next to 5719 Rue Dugal.

	<b>1759</b>				Maison Laberge is set on fire by the British in the Battle of Quebec on August 29th, 1759. All other houses on the north bank were set on fire, too. At the age of 62 years old, Jacques Laberge died on December 20th most likely from the cold, starvation and the burning of the family home.		
	<b>1760's</b>				It is presumed that Maison Laberge was rebuilt shortly thereafter. When it was rebuilt using the 2 surviving stone chimneys, the walls were made out of stone and the depth of the west (now center) portion was made the same depth as the original east portion. The windows at that time would have been 20 pane windows. The house would have looked like the one painted by Thomas Davies "A View of Chateau Richer" in 1787.

	<b>abt. 1810</b>				Around 1810, the house was again expanded to the west adding a 3rd false chimney. The window openings were slightly taller and the windows had 4 panes of glass (which they could then do) instead of 20. The window frames on the center and east portion of the house were cut and changed from 20 panes to 4 panes of glass. At this point, too, the entire roof was changed adding a soffit on on the north and south side of the house and changing it from wood shingles to a metal canadian roof.
